THE GOOD, THE BAD AND THE POOLING Pattern Stitch Suggestions

TILT THE ROWS

Bias Patterns

Example: Every RS row, decrease at start of row, increase at end.

Chevron Patterns

Example: Over a multiple of 10 stitches plus 1

Row 1 (RS): K1, *yo, k3, s2kpo, k3, yo, k1; rep from * to end.

Row 2: Purl

For both types of patterns, stitch count is constant. Balance increases and decreases.

BREAK THE COLUMNS - Leverage the 'Ugly' Colour Change

Seed Stitch

Flat - odd number of stitches.

All rows: [K1, p1] to last st, k1.

Put another way: Knit the purls, purl the knits.

Linen Stitch -1, 2 or more colours Flat - odd number of stitches.

Row 1 (RS): [K1, sl 1 p wyif] to last st, k1. Row 2: K1, [p1, sl 1 p wyib] to last 2 sts, p1, k1.

VARY THE HEIGHT OF THE STITCHES

Slipped Stitch Patterns

In the Round – multiple of four stitches

Rounds 1 & 2: (Sl 1 wyib, k3) around.

Round 3: Knit around.

Variations:

Change the spacing/position of the slipped stitches. Change the length of the slip -1 row/round rather

than 2.

Flat - multiple of four stitches plus three

Row 1 (RS): K3, (sl 1 p wyib, k3) to end. Row 2 (WS): P3, (sl 1 p wyif, p3) to end.

Row 3 (RS): Knit.

Row 4 (WS): P3, (sl 1 p wyif, p3) to end.

Row 5 (RS): K3, (sl 1 p wyib, k3) to end.

Row 6 (WS): Purl.

COMBINE WITH ANOTHER YARN Organized stripes

Disorganized stripes/'fading'

A sample fade...

Work in MC. Join CC.

Work 1 row/round CC.

Work 5 rows/rounds MC.

Work 2 rows/rounds CC.

Work 4 rows/rounds MC.

Work 3 rows/rounds CC

Work 3 rows/rounds MC

Work 5 rows/rounds CC

Work 1 row/round MC

Continue in CC only.

2- Colour Brioche

Stranded Colourwork

Slipped Stitch Colourwork 2-Color Eye of Partridge – worked over an odd number of stitches.

Row 1 (RS): With CC, k1, (sl 1 p wyib, k1).

Row 2 (WS): With CC, purl.

Row 3: With MC, k1, (k1, sl 1 p wyib) to last 2 sts,

k2.

Row 4: With MC, purl.

Glossary:

CC – contrast colour

MC - main colour

S2kpo - slip 2 tog, k1, pass slipped sts over

Sl 1 p - slip 1 st purlwise

Wyif – with yarn in front

Wyif – with yarn in back

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
